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## **Preface**

This manual is written for system integrators, PC technicians and knowledgeable PC users. It provides information for the installation and use of the X10DRi/X10DRi-T motherboard.

#### **About This Motherboard**

The Super X10DRi/X10DRi-T motherboard supports dual Intel E5-2600v3 Series Processors (Socket R3) that offer new Intel Microarchitecture 22nm Process Technology, delivering system performance, power efficiency, and feature sets to address the needs of next-generation computer users. With the PCH C612 built in, the X10DRi-(T) motherboard supports Hybrid-clock, Advanced Management Bus Infrastructure, and Intel® Node Manager 3.0. This motherboard is ideal for general-purpose server platforms. Please refer to our website (http://www.supermicro.com) for CPU and memory support updates.

**Appendix C** contains UEFI BIOS Recovery instructions.



## Motherboard Image







## 1-2 Processor and Chipset Overview

Built upon the functionality and capability of the Intel E5-2600v3 Series processors (Socket R3) and the Intel C612 PCH, the X10DRi/X10DRi-T motherboard provides system performance, power efficiency, and feature sets to address the needs of next-generation computer users.

With support of new Intel Microarchitecture 22nm Process Technology, the X10DRi/X10DRi-T dramatically increases system performance for a multitude of server applications.

The PCH C612 chip provides Enterprise SMbus support, including the following features:

- DDR4 288-pin memory support on Socket R3
- Hybrid clock support capable of extending to most 2S platforms
- Support for Management Engine (ME)
- Support of SMBus speeds of up to 400KHz for BMC connectivity
- Improved I/O capabilities to high-storage-capacity configurations
- SPI Enhancements
- Intel® Node Manager 3.0 for advanced power monitoring, capping and management for BMC enhancement (See the note below.)
- BMC supports remote management, virtualization, and the security package for enterprise platforms

Note: Node manager support is depending on the power supply used in your system.

## 1-3 Special Features

### Recovery from AC Power Loss

The Basic I/O System (BIOS) provides a setting that determines how the system will respond when AC power is lost and then restored to the system. You can choose for the system to remain powered off (in which case you must press the power switch to turn it back on), or for it to automatically return to the power-on state. See the Advanced BIOS Setup section for this setting. The default setting is **Last State**.

## 1-4 System Health Monitoring

This section describes the features of system health monitoring of the motherboard. This motherboard has an onboard BaseBoard Management Controller (BMC) that supports system health monitoring. An onboard voltage monitor will scan the following onboard voltages continuously: 1.2V, +3.3V, 3.3V Standby, +5V, +5V Standby, +12V, CPU Core, Memory, Chipset, and Battery Voltages. Once a voltage becomes unstable, a warning is given, or an error message is sent to the screen. The user can adjust the voltage thresholds to define the sensitivity of the voltage monitor.

#### Fan Status Monitor with Firmware Control

System health monitoring support provided by the BMC controller can check the RPM status of a cooling fan. The onboard CPU and chassis fans are controlled by IPMI Thermal Management.

## **Environmental Temperature Control**

System Health sensors monitor temperatures and voltage settings of onboard processors and the system in real time via the IPMI interface. Whenever the temperature of the CPU or the system exceeds a user-defined threshold, system/CPU cooling fans will be turned on to prevent the CPU or the system from overheating.

Note: To avoid possible system overheating, please be sure to provide adequate airflow to your system.

## **System Resource Alert**

This feature is available when used with SuperDoctor 5. SuperDoctor 5 is used to notify the user of certain system events. For example, you can configure SuperDoctor 5 to provide you with warnings when the system temperature, CPU temperatures, voltages, and fan speeds go beyond a predefined range.

## 1-5 ACPI Features

ACPI stands for Advanced Configuration and Power Interface. The ACPI specification defines a flexible and abstract hardware interface that provides a standard way to integrate power management features throughout a PC system, including its hardware, operating system and application software. This enables the system to automatically turn on and off peripherals such as CD-ROMs, network cards, hard disk drives and printers.

In addition to operating system-directed power management, ACPI also provides a generic system event mechanism for Plug and Play, and an operating system-independent interface for configuration control. ACPI leverages the Plug and Play BIOS data structures, while providing a processor architecture-independent implementation that is compatible with Windows 8, and Windows 2012 Operating Systems.

## 1-6 Power Supply

As with all computer products, a stable power source is necessary for proper and reliable operation. It is even more important for processors that have high CPU clock rates

The X10DRi/X10DRi-T motherboard accommodates 24-pin ATX power supplies. Although most power supplies generally meet the specifications required by the CPU, some are inadequate. In addition, two 12V 8-pin power connections are also required to ensure adequate power supply to the system.

**Warning!** To avoid damaging the power supply or the motherboard, be sure to use a power supply that contains a 24-pin and two 8-pin power connectors. Be sure to connect the power supply to the 24-pin power connector (J24), and two 8-pin power connectors (JPWR1, JPWR2) on the motherboard. Failure in doing so may void the manufacturer warranty on your power supply and motherboard.

It is strongly recommended that you use a high quality power supply that meets ATX power supply Specification 2.02 or above. It must also be SSI compliant. (For more information, please refer to the website at http://www.ssiforum.org/). Additionally, in areas where noisy power transmission is present, you may choose to install a line filter to shield the computer from noise. It is recommended that you also install a power surge protector to help avoid problems caused by power surges.

## 1-7 Advanced Power Management

The following new advanced power management features are supported by this motherboard:

## Intel® Intelligent Power Node Manager (NM) (Available when the Supermicro Power Manager [SPM] is Installed)

The Intel® Intel® Intelligent Power Node Manager 3.0 (IPNM) provides your system with real-time thermal control and power management for maximum energy efficiency. IPNM is supported by the motherboard; however, Node Manager support also depends on the power supply used in the system.

Management Engine (ME)

The Management Engine, which is an ARC controller embedded in the PCH, provides Server Platform Services (SPS) to your system. The services provided by SPS are different from those provided by the ME on client platforms.

#### 2-2 Static-Sensitive Devices

- Put the motherboard and peripherals back into their antistatic bags when not in use.
- For grounding purposes, make sure that your system chassis provides excellent conductivity between the power supply, the case, the mounting fasteners and the motherboard

#### Unpacking


The motherboard is shipped in antistatic packaging to avoid static damage. When unpacking the motherboard, make sure that the person handling it is static protected.

#### 2-3 Motherboard Installation

All motherboards have standard mounting holes to fit different types of chassis. Make sure that the locations of all the mounting holes for both motherboard and chassis match. Although a chassis may have both plastic and metal mounting fasteners, metal ones are highly recommended because they ground the motherboard to the chassis. Make sure that the metal standoffs click in or are screwed in tightly. Then use a screwdriver to secure the motherboard onto the motherboard tray.



There are ten (10) mounting holes on this motherboard indicated by the arrows.




**Caution:** 1) To avoid damaging the motherboard and its components, please do not use a force greater than 8 lb/inch on each mounting screw during motherboard installation. 2) Some components are very close to the mounting holes. Please take precautionary measures to prevent damage to these components when installing the motherboard to the chassis.


## Installing the Motherboard

**Note**: Always connect the power cord last, and always remove it before adding, removing or changing any hardware components.


1. Install the I/O shield into the chassis.




- 2. Locate the mounting holes on the motherboard.
- 3. Locate the matching mounting holes on the chassis. Align the mounting holes on the motherboard against the mounting holes on the chassis.
- 4. Install standoffs in the chassis as needed.



- 5. Install the motherboard into the chassis carefully to avoid damaging mother-board components.
- Using the Phillips screwdriver, insert a Pan head #6 screw into a mounting hole on the motherboard and its matching mounting hole on the chassis.



- 7. Repeat Step 5 to insert #6 screws into all mounting holes.
- 8. Make sure that the motherboard is securely placed in the chassis.



#### 2-4 Processor and Heatsink Installation

**Warning:** When handling the processor package, avoid placing direct pressure on the label area. Also, improper CPU installation or socket/pin misalignment can cause serious damage to the CPU or the motherboard that will require RMA repairs. Be sure to read and follow all instructions thoroughly before installing your CPU and heatsink.



#### Notes:

Always connect the power cord last, and always remove it before adding, removing or changing any hardware components. Make sure that you install the processor into the CPU socket before you install the CPU heatsink.

If you buy a CPU separately, make sure that you use an Intel-certified multi-directional heatsink only.

Make sure to install the motherboard into the chassis before you install the CPU heatsink.


When receiving a motherboard without a processor pre-installed, make sure that the plastic CPU socket cap is in place and none of the socket pins are bent; otherwise, contact your retailer immediately.

## Installing the LGA2011 Processor


 There are two load levers on the LGA2011 socket. To open the socket cover, first press and release the load lever labeled 'Open 1st'.





Press the second load lever labeled 'Close 1st' to release the load plate that covers the CPU socket from its locking position.




With the lever labelled 'Close 1st' fully retracted, gently push down on the lever labelled 'Open 1st' to open the load plate. Lift the load plate to open it completely.




**Note:** All graphics, drawings and pictures shown in this manual are for illustration only. The components that came with your machine may or may not look exactly the same as those shown in this manual.

 Use your thumb and the index finger to loosen the lever and open the load plate.



Using your thumb and index finger, hold the CPU on its edges. Align the CPU keys, which are semi-circle cutouts, against the socket keys.





Once they are aligned, carefully lower the CPU straight down into the socket. (Do not drop the CPU on the socket. Do not move the CPU horizontally or vertically. Do not rub the CPU against the surface or against any pins of the socket to avoid damaging the CPU or the socket.)



Warning: You can only install the CPU inside the socket in one direction. Make sure that it is properly inserted into the CPU socket before closing the load plate. If it doesn't close properly, do not force it as it may damage your CPU. Instead, open the load plate again to make sure that the CPU is aligned properly.

With the CPU inside the socket, inspect the four corners of the CPU to make sure that the CPU is properly installed.






2 Push down and lock the lever labelled 'Close 1st'.



8. Close the load plate with the CPU inside the socket. Lock the lever labelled 'Close 1st' first, then lock the lever labelled 'Open 1st' second. Using your thumb gently push the load levers down to the lever locks.



## Installing a Passive CPU Heatsink

- Do not apply any thermal grease to the heatsink or the CPU die -- the required amount has already been applied.
- Place the heatsink on top of the CPU so that the four mounting holes are aligned with those on the Motherboard and the Heatsink Bracket underneath.
- 3. Screw in two diagonal screws (i.e., the #1 and the #2 screws) until just snug (-do not over-tighten the screws to avoid possible damage to the CPU.)
- 4. Finish the installation by fully tightening all four screws.




Note: For optimized airflow, please follow your chassis airflow direction to properly install the heatsink. Graphic drawings included in this manual are for reference only. They might look different from the components installed in your system.

## Removing the Heatsink

**Warning:** We do not recommend that the CPU or the heatsink be removed. However, if you do need to uninstall the heatsink, please follow the instructions below to uninstall the heatsink to prevent damage done to the CPU or the CPU socket.

- Unscrew the heatsink screws from the motherboard in the sequence as shown in the illustration below
- Gently wriggle the heatsink to loosen it from the CPU. (Do not use excessive force when wriggling the heatsink!)
- Once the CPU is loosened from the socket, remove the CPU from the CPU socket
- 4. Remove the used thermal grease and clean the surface of the CPU and the heatsink, Reapply the proper amount of thermal grease on the surface before reinstalling the CPU and the heatsink.



Notes: 1. For optimized airflow, please follow your chassis airflow direction to properly install the heatsink. 2. Graphics shown in this manual are for reference only. They may or may not look the same as the components installed in your system.

## 2-5 Installing and Removing the Memory Modules


Note: Check Supermicro's website for recommended memory modules.

#### CAUTION

Exercise extreme care when installing or removing DIMM modules to prevent any possible damage.

## Installing & Removing DIMMs

- Insert the desired number of DIMMs into the memory slots, starting with DIMM A1. (For best performance, please use the memory modules of the same type and speed in the same bank.)
- 2. Push the release tabs outwards on both ends of the DIMM slot to unlock it.



- Align the key of the DIMM module with the receptive point on the memory slot.
- Align the notches on both ends of the module against the receptive points on the ends of the slot.
- Use two thumbs together to press the notches on both ends of the module straight down into the slot until the module snaps into place.
- Press the release tabs to the locking positions to secure the DIMM module into the slot.

Press both notches straight down into the memory slot at the same time.

## **Removing Memory Modules**

Press both notches on the ends of the DIMM module to unlock it. Once the DIMM module is loosened, remove it from the memory slot.

## Memory Support for the X10DRi/X10DRi-T Motherboard

The X10DRi/X10DRi-T Motherboard supports up to 1024 GB of Load Reduced (LRDIMM) or 512 GB of Registered (RDIMM) DDR4 (288-pin) ECC 2133/1866/1600 MHz modules in 16 slots. The front UID switch and the front UID LED are both located on the Front Panel Control (JF1) (with the front UID switch on pin 13, and the front LED on pin 7 of JF1). When you press the front or the rear UID switch, both front and rear UID LEDs will be turned on. Press the UID switch again to turn off the LED indicators. # **Chapter 3**

# **Troubleshooting**

## 3-1 Troubleshooting Procedures

Use the following procedures to troubleshoot your system. If you have followed all of the procedures below and still need assistance, refer to the 'Technical Support Procedures' and/or 'Returning Merchandise for Service' section(s) in this chapter. Note: Always disconnect the power cord before adding, changing or installing any hardware components.

#### **Before Power On**

- Make sure that there are no short circuits between the motherboard and chassis.
- Disconnect all ribbon/wire cables from the motherboard, including those for the keyboard and mouse.
- 3. Remove all add-on cards.
- Install CPU 1 first (making sure it is fully seated) and connect the front panel connectors to the motherboard

#### No Power

- 1. Make sure that no short circuits between the motherboard and the chassis.
- 2. Make sure that the ATX power connectors are properly connected.
- Check that the 115V/230V switch on the power supply is properly set, if available.
- 4. Turn the power switch on and off to test the system, if applicable.
- The battery on your motherboard may be old. Check to verify that it still supplies ~3VDC. If it does not, replace it with a new one.

#### No Video

- If the power is on, but you have no video, remove all the add-on cards and cables
- Use the speaker to determine if any beep codes exist. Refer to Appendix A for details on beep codes.

## **System Boot Failure**

If the system does not display POST or does not respond after the power is turned on, check the following:

- 1. Check for any error beep from the motherboard speaker.
- If there is no error beep, try to turn on the system without DIMM modules installed. If there is still no error beep, try to turn on the system again with only one processor installed in CPU Socket#1. If there is still no error beep, replace the motherboard
- If there are error beeps, clear the CMOS settings by unplugging the power cord and contracting both pads on the CMOS Clear Jumper (JBT1). (Refer to Section 2-8 in Chapter 2.)
- Remove all components from the motherboard, especially the DIMM modules.Make sure that system power is on, and memory error beeps are activated.
- Turn on the system with only one DIMM module installed. If the system boots, check for bad DIMM modules or slots by following the Memory Errors Troubleshooting procedure in this Chapter.

# Losing the System's Setup Configuration

- Make sure that you are using a high quality power supply. A poor quality power supply may cause the system to lose the CMOS setup information. Refer to Section 2-7 for details on recommended power supplies.
- The battery on your motherboard may be old. Check to verify that it still supplies ~3VDC. If it does not, replace it with a new one.
- If the above steps do not fix the Setup Configuration problem, contact your vendor for repairs.

## **Memory Errors**

When a No-Memory Beep Code is issued by the system, check the following:

- Make sure that the memory modules are compatible with the system and that the DIMM modules are properly and fully installed. (For memory compatibility, refer to the Memory Compatibility Chart posted on our website @ http://www. supermicro.com.)
- Check if different speeds of DIMMs have been installed. It is strongly recommended that you use the same RAM type and speed for all DIMMs in the system.
- Make sure that you are using the correct type of Load Reduction (LRDIMM)/ Registered (RDIMM) ECC DDR4 DIMM modules recommended by the manufacturer.
- Check for bad DIMM modules or slots by swapping a single module among all memory slots and check the results.
- Make sure that all memory modules are fully seated in their slots. Follow the instructions given in Section 2-5 in Chapter 2.
- Please follow the instructions given in the DIMM Population Tables listed in Section 2-5 to install your memory modules.

# When the System Becomes Unstable

- A. When the system becomes unstable during or after OS installation, check the following:
- CPU/BIOS support: Make sure that your CPU is supported, and you have the latest BIOS installed in your system.
- 2. Memory support: Make sure that the memory modules are supported by testing the modules using memtest86 or a similar utility.
  - / Note: Refer to the product page on our website http:\\www.supermicro. com for memory and CPU support and updates.
- HDD support: Make sure that all hard disk drives (HDDs) work properly. Replace the bad HDDs with good ones.
- System cooling: Check system cooling to make sure that all heatsink fans, and CPU/system fans, etc., work properly. Check Hardware Monitoring set-

tings in the BIOS to make sure that the CPU and System temperatures are within the normal range. Also check the front panel Overheat LED, and make sure that the Overheat LED is not on.

- Adequate power supply: Make sure that the power supply provides adequate power to the system. Make sure that all power connectors are connected. Please refer to our website for more information on minimum power requirement.
- 6. Proper software support: Make sure that the correct drivers are used.

# B. When the system becomes unstable before or during OS installation, check the following:

- Source of installation: Make sure that the devices used for installation are working properly, including boot devices such as CD/DVD disc, CD/DVD-ROM
- Cable connection: Check to make sure that all cables are connected and working properly.
- 3. Using minimum configuration for troubleshooting: Remove all unnecessary components (starting with add-on cards first), and use minimum configuration (with a CPU and a memory module installed) to identify the trouble areas. Refer to the steps listed in Section A above for proper troubleshooting procedures.
- 4. Identifying bad components by isolating them: If necessary, remove a component in question from the chassis, and test it in isolation to make sure that it works properly. Replace a bad component with a good one.
- Check and change one component at a time instead of changing several items at the same time. This will help isolate and identify the problem.
- 6. To find out if a component is good, swap this component with a new one to see if the system will work properly. If so, then the old component is bad. You can also install the component in question in another system. If the new system works, the component is good and the old system has problems.

# 3-2 Technical Support Procedures

Before contacting Technical Support, please take the following steps. Also, please note that as a motherboard manufacturer, Supermicro also sells motherboards

through its channels, so it is best to first check with your distributor or reseller for troubleshooting services. They should know of any possible problem(s) with the specific system configuration that was sold to you.


## **Battery Removal**

To remove the onboard battery, follow the steps below:

- 1. Power off your system and unplug your power cable.
- 2. Locate the onboard battery as shown below.
- Using a tool such as a pen or a small screwdriver, push the battery lock outwards to unlock it. Once unlocked, the battery will pop out from the holder.
- 4. Remove the battery.

## **Proper Battery Disposal**

**Warning!** Please handle used batteries carefully. Do not damage the battery in any way; a damaged battery may release hazardous materials into the environment. Do not discard a used battery in the garbage or a public landfill. Please comply with the regulations set up by your local hazardous waste management agency to dispose of your used battery properly.



## 3-4 Frequently Asked Questions

Question: What are the various types of memory that my motherboard can support?

**Answer:** The motherboard supports Registered ECC DDR4 DIMM modules. To enhance memory performance, do not mix memory modules of different speeds and sizes. Please follow all memory installation instructions given on Section 2-4 in Chapter 2.

Question: How do I update my BIOS?

It is recommended that you <u>do not</u> upgrade your BIOS if you are not experiencing any problems with your system. Updated BIOS files are located on our website at <a href="http://www.supermicro.com">http://www.supermicro.com</a>. Please check our BIOS warning message and the information on how to update your BIOS on our website. Select your motherboard model and download the BIOS file to your computer. Also, check the current BIOS revision to make sure that it is newer than your BIOS before downloading. You can choose from the zip file and the .exe file. If you choose the zip BIOS file, please unzip the BIOS file onto a bootable USB device. Run the batch file using the format AMI.bat filename.rom from your bootable USB device to flash the BIOS. Then, your system will automatically reboot.

**Warning**: Do not shut down or reset the system while updating the BIOS to prevent possible system boot failure!)



**Note**: The SPI BIOS chip used on this motherboard cannot be removed. Send your motherboard back to our RMA Department at Supermicro for repair. For BIOS Recovery instructions, please refer to the AMI BIOS Recovery Instructions posted at http://www.supermicro.com.

#### Question: How do I handle the used battery?

**Answer:** Please handle used batteries carefully. Do not damage the battery in any way; a damaged battery may release hazardous materials into the environment. Do not discard a used battery in the garbage or a public landfill. Please comply with the regulations set up by your local hazardous waste management agency to dispose of your used battery properly.

# 3-5 Returning Merchandise for Service

A receipt or copy of your invoice marked with the date of purchase is required before any warranty service will be rendered. # Chapter 4

### **BIOS**

#### 4-1 Introduction

This chapter describes the AMI BIOS setup utility for the X10DRi/X10DRi-T. The ROM BIOS is stored in a Flash EEPROM and can be easily updated. This chapter describes the basic navigation of the AMI BIOS setup utility screens.

Note: For AMI BIOS recovery, please refer to the UEFI BIOS Recovery Instructions in Appendix C.

## **Starting BIOS Setup Utility**

To enter the AMI BIOS setup utility screens, press the <Delete> key while the system is booting up.

Note: In most cases, the <Delete> key is used to invoke the AMI BIOS setup screen. There are a few cases when other keys are used, such as <F1> <F2> etc

Each main BIOS menu option is described in this manual. The AMI BIOS setup menu screen has two main frames. The left frame displays all the options that can be configured. Grayed-out options cannot be configured. Options in blue can be configured by the user. The right frame displays the key legend. Above the key legend is an area reserved for a text message. When an option is selected in the left frame, it is highlighted in white. Often a text message will accompany it.

**Note**: the AMI BIOS has default text messages built in. Supermicro retains the option to include, omit, or change any of these text messages.

The AMI BIOS setup utility uses a key-based navigation system called "hot keys." Most of the AMI BIOS setup utility "hot keys" can be used at any time during the setup navigation process. These keys include <F1>, <F4>, <Enter>, <Esc>, arrow keys, etc.

Note: Options printed in **Bold** are default settings.

# **How To Change the Configuration Data**

The configuration data that determines the system parameters may be changed by entering the AMI BIOS setup utility. This setup utility can be accessed by pressing <Del> at the appropriate time during system boot.


## How to Start the Setup Utility

Normally, the only visible Power-On Self-Test (POST) routine is the memory test. As the memory is being tested, press the <Delete> key to enter the main menu of the AMI BIOS setup utility. From the main menu, you can access the other setup screens. An AMI BIOS identification string is displayed at the left bottom corner of the screen, below the copyright message.

**Warning:** Do not upgrade the BIOS unless your system has a BIOS-related issue. Flashing the wrong BIOS can cause irreparable damage to the system. In no event shall Supermicro be liable for direct, indirect, special, incidental, or consequential damages arising from a BIOS update. If you have to update the BIOS, do not shut down or reset the system while the BIOS is updating. This is to avoid possible boot failure.

## 4-2 Main Setup

When you first enter the AMI BIOS setup utility, you will enter the Main setup screen. You can always return to the Main setup screen by selecting the Main tab on the top of the screen. The Main BIOS setup screen is shown below.



The following Main menu items will be displayed:

# System Date/System Time

Use this option to change the system date and time. Highlight *System Date* or *System Time* using the arrow keys. Enter new values using the keyboard. Press the <Tab> key or the arrow keys to move between fields. The date must be entered in Day MM/DD/YYYY format. The time is entered in HH:MM:SS format.



**Note:** The time is in the 24-hour format. For example, 5:30 P.M. appears as 17:30:00

# Supermicro X10DRi

Version: This item displays the version of the BIOS ROM used in the system.

**Build Date:** This item displays the date when the version of the BIOS ROM used in the system was built.

# **Memory Information**

**Total Memory:** This item displays the total size of memory available in the system.

**Memory Speed:** This item displays the default speed of the memory modules installed in the system.

# 4-3 Advanced Setup Configurations

Use the arrow keys to select Advanced setup and press <Enter> to access the submenu items:



**Warning**: Take Caution when changing the Advanced settings. An incorrect value, a very high DRAM frequency or an incorrect BIOS timing setting may cause the system to malfunction. When this occurs, restore the setting to the manufacture default setting.

# **▶**Boot Feature

# **Quiet Boot**

Use this feature to select the screen display between POST messages or the OEM logo at bootup. Select Disabled to display the POST messages. Select Enabled to display the OEM logo instead of the normal POST messages. The options are **Enabled** and Disabled.

# AddOn ROM Display Mode

Use this item to set the display mode for the Option ROM. Select Keep Current to use the current AddOn ROM display setting. Select Force BIOS to use the Option ROM display mode set by the system BIOS. The options are **Force BIOS** and Keep Current.

#### **Bootup Num-Lock**

Use this feature to set the Power-on state for the Numlock key. The options are Off and **On**.

#### Wait For 'F1' If Error

Select Enabled to force the system to wait until the 'F1' key is pressed if an error occurs. The options are Disabled and **Enabled**.

## **Interrupt 19 Capture**

Interrupt 19 is the software interrupt that handles the boot disk function. When this item is set to Immediate, the ROM BIOS of the host adaptors will "capture" Interrupt 19 at bootup immediately and allow the drives that are attached to these host adaptors to function as bootable disks. If this item is set to Postponed, the ROM BIOS of the host adaptors will not capture Interrupt 19 immediately and allow the drives attached to these adaptors to function as bootable devices at bootup. The options are **Immediate** and Postponed.

# Re-try Boot

When EFI Boot is selected, the system BIOS will automatically reboot the system from an EFI boot device after its initial boot failure. Select Legacy Boot to allow the BIOS to automatically reboot the system from a Legacy boot device after its initial boot failure. The options are **Disabled**, Legacy Boot, and EFI Boot.

# **Power Configuration**

# Watch Dog Function

Select Enabled to allow the Watch Dog timer to reboot the system when it is inactive for more than 5 minutes. The options are Enabled and **Disabled.** 

# **Power Button Function**

This feature controls how the system shuts down when the power button is pressed. Select 4 Seconds Override for the user to power off the system after pressing and holding the power button for 4 seconds or longer. Select Instant Off to instantly power off the system as soon as the user presses the power button. The options are 4 Seconds Override and Instant Off.

#### **Restore on AC Power Loss**

Use this feature to set the power state after a power outage. Select Power-Off for the system power to remain off after a power loss. Select Power-On for the system power to be turned on after a power loss. Select Last State to allow the system to resume its last power state before a power loss. The options are Power-On, Stay-Off and Last State.

# ► North Bridge

This feature allows the user to configure the settings for the Intel North Bridge.

# ►IIO Configuration

# EV DFX (Device Function On-Hide) Features

When this feature is set to Enable, the EV\_DFX Lock Bits that are located on a processor will always remain clear during electric tuning. The options are **Disable** and Enable.

# ►IIO0 Configuration

# IOU2 (II0 PCIe Port 1)

This item configures the PCI-E port Bifuraction setting for a PCI-E port specified by the user. The options are x4x4, x8, and **Auto**.

# IOU0 (II0 PCIe Port 2)

This item configures the PCI-E port Bifuraction setting for a PCI-E port specified by the user. The options are x4x4x4x4, x4x4x8, x8x4x4, x8x8, x16, and **Auto**.

# IOU1 (II0 PCIe Port 3)

This item configures the PCI-E port Bifuraction setting for a PCI-E port specified by the user. The options are x4x4x4x4, x4x4x8, x8x4x4, x8x8, x16, and **Auto**.

#### No PCIe Port Active ECO

Use this feature to select a workaround setting to implement the engineering-change order (ECO) on the system when the PCI ports specified by the user are not active. The options are **PCU Squelch exit ignore option** and Reset the SQ FLOP by CSR option.

# ► Socket 0 PCIeD00F0 - Port 0/DMI

# Link Speed

This item configures the link speed of a PCI-E port specified by the user. The options are Gen 1 (Generation 1) (2.5 GT/s) and **Gen 2 (Generation 2)**.

# **PCI-E Port DeEmphasis**

This item configures the De-Emphasis Control (LANKCON2 [6]) setting for this computer. The options are **-6.0 dB** and **-**3.5 dB.

The following items will be display:

## PCI-E Port L0s Exit Latency

Use this feature to set the length of time required for the port specified by the user to complete the transition from L0s to L0. The default setting is 4uS - 8uS.

# PCI-E Port L1 Exit Latency

Use this feature to set the length of time required for the port specified by the user to complete the transition from L1 to L0. The default setting is <1uS, 1uS - 2uS, 2uS - 4uS, 4uS - 8uS, 8uS - 16uS, 16uS - 32uS, 32uS - 64uS, and >64uS.

# Fatal Err (Error) Over

Select Enable to force fatal error prorogation to the IIO core error logic for the port specified by the user. The options are **Disable** and Enable.

#### Non-Fatal Err (Error) Over

Select Enable to force non-fatal error prorogation to the IIO core error logic for the port specified by the user. The options are **Disable** and Enable.

# Corr Err (Correctable Error) Over

Select Enable to force correctable error prorogation to the IIO core error logic for the port specified by the user. The options are **Disable** and Enable.

# L0s Support

When this item is set to Disable, II0 will not put its transmitter in the L0s state. The default setting is **Disable**.

# ►IIO1 Configuration

#### IOU2 (II0 PCIe Port 1)

This item configures the PCI-E port Bifuraction setting for a PCI-E port specified by the user. The options are x4x4, x8, and **Auto**.

## IOU0 (II0 PCIe Port 2)

This item configures the PCI-E port Bifuraction setting for a PCI-E port specified by the user. The options are x4x4x4x4, x4x4x8, x8x4x4, x8x8, x16, and **Auto**.

# IOU1 (II0 PCIe Port 3)

This item configures the PCI-E port Bifuraction setting for a PCI-E port specified by the user. The options are x4x4x4x4. x4x4x8. x8x4x4. x8x8. x16. and **Auto**.

#### No PCIe Port Active ECO

Use this feature to select a workaround setting to implement the engineeringchange order (ECO) on the system when PCI ports are not active. The options are **PCU Squelch exit ignore option** and Reset the SQ FLOP by CSR option.

# **▶IOAT Configuration**

#### Enable I/OAT

Select Enable to enable Intel I/OAT (I/O Acceleration Technology), which significantly reduces CPU overhead by leveraging CPU architectural improvements and freeing the system resource for other tasks. The options are Enable and **Disable**.

#### No Snoop

Select Enable to support no-snoop mode for each CB device. The options are **Disable** and Enable.

# **Relaxed Ordering**

Select Enable to enable Relaxed Ordering support which will allow certain transactions to violate the strict-ordering rules of PCI and to be completed prior to other transactions that have already been enqueued. The options are **Disable** and Enable.

# ► Intel VT for Directed I/O (VT-d)

#### Intel VT for Direct I/O (VT-d)

# Intel® VT for Directed I/O (VT-d)

Select Enable to use Intel Virtualization Technology support for Direct I/O VT-d support by reporting the I/O device assignments to the VMM (Virtual Machine Monitor) through the DMAR ACPI tables. This feature offers fully-protected I/O resource sharing across Intel platforms, providing greater reliability, security and availability in networking and data-sharing. The options are **Enable** and Disable.

# Interrupt Remapping

Select Enable for Interrupt Remapping support to enhance system performance. The options are **Enable** and Disable.

# Coherency Support (Non-Isoch)

Select Enable for the Non-Iscoh VT-d engine to pass through DMA (Direct Memory Access) to enhance system performance. The options are Enable and **Disable**.

# Coherency Support (Isoch)

Select Enable for the Iscoh VT-d engine to pass through ATS to enhance system performance. The options are Enable and **Disable**.

# ▶ QPI (Quick Path Interconnect) Configuration

The following QPI information will be displayed:

- Number of CPU
- Number of II0
- Current QPI Link Speed: This item displays the current QPI Link speed.
- Current QPI Link Frequency: This item displays the frequency of the QPI Link.
- QPI Global MMIO Low Base / Limit
- QPI Global MMIO High Base / Limit

### **Link Speed Mode**

Use this feature to select data transfer speed for QPI Link connections. The options are **Fast** and Slow

#### **Link Frequency Select**

Use this feature to select the desired QPI frequency. The options are 6.4 GT/s, 8.0 GT/s, 9.6 GT/s, **Auto**, and Auto Limited.

#### Link L0p Enable

Select Enable to enable Link L0p. The options are Disable and Enable.

### Link L1 Enable

Select Enable to enable Link L1 (Level 1 link). The options are Disable and **Enable** 

## Isoc Mode

Select Enabled to enable Isochronous support to meet QoS (Quality of Service) requirements. This feature is especially important for Virtualization Technology. The options are Enable and **Disable**.

# **►**Memory Configuration

#### **Enforce POR**

Select Enable to enforce POR restrictions on DDR4 frequency and voltage programming. The options are **Auto**, Enforce POR, Disabled and Enforce Stretch Goals.

## **Memory Frequency**

Use this feature to set the maximum memory frequency for onboard memory modules. The options are **Auto**, 1333, 1400, 1600, 1800, 1867, 2000, 2133, 2200, 2400, 2600, 2667, and Reserved (Do not select Reserved).

# **ECC Support**

Select Enable to enable Error Checking & Correction (ECC) support for onboard memory modules. The options are **Auto**, Enable and Disable.

### **Data Scrambling**

Select Enabled to enable data scrambling to enhance system performance and data integrity. The options are **Auto**, Disabled and Enabled.

#### **Enable ADR**

Select Enabled for ADR (Automatic Diagnostic Repository) support to enhance memory performance. The options are Enabled and **Disabled**.

# DRAM RAPL (Running Average Power Limit) Baseline

Use this feature to set the run-time power-limit baseline for DRAM modules. The options are Disable, DRAM RAPL Mode 0, and **DRAM RAPL Mode 1**.

#### Set Throttling Mode

Throttling improves reliability and reduces power consumption in the processor via automatic voltage control during processor idle states. The options are Disabled and **CLTT** (Closed Loop Thermal Throttling).

#### Socket Interleave Below 4GB

Select Enabled for the memory above the 4G Address space to be split between two sockets. The options are Enable and **Disable**.

#### Channel Interleaving

Use this item to set DIMM channel interleaving mood. The options are **Auto**, 1-Way Interleave, 2-Way Interleave, 3-Way Interleave, and 4-Way Interleave.

# Rank Interleaving

Use this item to select a rank memory interleaving method. The options are **Auto**, 1-Way, 2-Way, 4-Way, and 8-Way.

#### A7 Mode

Select Enabled to support the A7 (Addressing) mode to improve memory performance. The options are **Enable** and Disable.

### **▶**DIMM Information

This item displays the status of a DIMM module specified by the user.

- P1 DIMMA1
- P1 DIMMB1
- P1 DIMMC1
- P1 DIMMD1

# ► Memory RAS (Reliability\_Availability\_Serviceability) Configuration

Use this submenu to configure the following Memory RAS settings.

# **RAS Mode**

When Disable is selected, RAS is not supported. When Mirror is selected, the motherboard maintains two identical copies of all data in memory for data backup. When Lockstep is selected, the motherboard uses two areas of memory to run the same set of operations in parallel to boost performance. The options are **Disable**, Mirror, and Lockstep Mode.

#### Lockstep x4 DIMMs

Select Enable to enable Lockstep support for x4 DIMM modules. The options are **Auto**, Disabled, and Enabled.

### **Memory Rank Sparing**

Select Enable to enable memory-sparing support for memory ranks to improve memory performance. The options are **Disabled** and Enabled.

#### **Patrol Scrub**

Patrol Scrubbing is a process that allows the CPU to correct correctable memory errors detected on a memory module and send the correction to the requestor (the original source). When this item is set to Enabled, the IO hub will read and

write back one cache line every 16K cycles, if there is no delay caused by internal processing. By using this method, roughly 64 GB of memory behind the IO hub will be scrubbed every day. The options are **Enable** and Disable.

#### **Patrol Scrub Interval**

This feature allows you to decide how many hours the system should wait before the next complete patrol scrub is performed. Use the keyboard to enter a value from 0-24.

#### **Demand Scrub**

Demand Scrubbing is a process that allows the CPU to correct correctable memory errors found on a memory module. When the CPU or I/O issues a demand-read command, and the read data from memory turns out to be a correctable error, the error is corrected and sent to the requestor (the original source). Memory is updated as well. Select Enable to use Demand Scrubbing for ECC memory correction. The options are Enable and **Disable**.

# **Device Tagging**

Select Enable to support device tagging. The options are **Disable** and Enable.

# **Legacy USB Support**

Select Enabled to support onboard legacy USB devices. Select Auto to disable legacy support if there are no legacy USB devices present. Select Disable to have all USB devices available for EFI applications only. The options are **Enabled**, Disabled and Auto.

# **USB 3.0 Support**

Select Enabled for USB 3.0 support. The options are Smart Auto, **Auto**, Enabled, Disabled and Manual.

#### **XHCI Hand-Off**

This is a work-around solution for operating systems that do not support XHCI (Extensible Host Controller Interface) hand-off. The XHCI ownership change should be claimed by the XHCI driver. The settings are **Enabled** and Disabled.

#### **EHCI Hand-Off**

This item is for operating systems that do not support Enhanced Host Controller Interface (EHCI) hand-off. When this item is enabled, EHCI ownership change will be claimed by the EHCI driver. The settings are Enabled and **Disabled**.

## **USB Mass Storage Driver Support**

Select Enabled for USB mass storage device support. The options are Disabled and **Enabled** 

#### Port 60/64 Emulation

Select Enabled for I/O port 60h/64h emulation support, which in turn, will provide complete legacy USB keyboard support for the operating systems that do not support legacy USB devices. The options are Disabled and **Enabled**.

#### **USB Transfer Time-outs:**

#### **USB Transfer Time-out**

This feature is used to set the USB time-out value so that the tasks of USB control, bulk, and interrupt transfer can be performed during the time-out period. The settings are 1 second, 5 seconds, 10 seconds, and **20 Seconds**.

When this item is set to Enabled, the SATA AHCI controller manages the power usage of the SATA link. 





To set this feature, select Restore Defaults from the Exit menu and press <Enter>. These are manufacture default settings designed for maximum system performance but not for maximum stability.

#### Save As User Defaults

To set this feature, select Save as User Defaults from the Exit menu and press <Enter>. This enables the user to save any changes to the BIOS setup for future use.

#### **Restore User Defaults**

To set this feature, select Restore User Defaults from the Exit menu and press <Enter>. Use this feature to retrieve user-defined settings that were saved previously.

#### **Boot Override**

This feature allows the user to override the Boot priorities sequence in the Boot menu, and immediately boot the system with another device specified by the user. This is a one-time override.

# Appendix A

# **BIOS Error Beep Codes**

During the POST (Power-On Self-Test) routines, which are performed at each system boot, errors may occur.

**Non-fatal errors** are those which, in most cases, allow the system to continue to boot. The error messages normally appear on the screen.

**Fatal errors** will not allow the system to continue with bootup procedure. If a fatal error occurs, you should consult with your system manufacturer for possible repairs.

These fatal errors are usually communicated through a series of audible beeps. The numbers on the fatal error list correspond to the number of beeps for the corresponding error.

# Software Installation Instructions

# **B-1 Installing Software Programs**

The Supermicro ftp site contains drivers and utilities for your system at ftp://ftp.supermicro.com. Some of these must be installed, such as the chipset driver.

After accessing the ftp site, go into the CDR\_Images directory and locate the ISO file for your motherboard. Download this file to create a CD/DVD of the drivers and utilities it contains. (You may also use a utility to extract the ISO file if preferred.)

Another option is to go to the Supermicro Website at <a href="http://www.supermicro.com/">http://www.supermicro.com/</a> products/. Find the product page for your motherboard here, where you may download individual drivers and utilities.

After creating a CD/DVD with the ISO files, insert the disk into the CD/DVD drive on your system and the display shown below should appear.

**Note 1:** Click the icons showing a hand writing on paper to view the readme files for each item. Click the computer icons to the right of these items to install each item (from top to the bottom) one at a time. **After installing each item, you must re-boot the system before moving on to the next item on the list.** The bottom icon with a CD on it allows you to view the entire contents.

**Note 2**: When making a storage driver diskette by booting into a Driver CD, please set the SATA Configuration to "Compatible Mode" and configure SATA as IDE in the BIOS Setup. After making the driver diskette, be sure to change the SATA settings back to your original settings.

# **B-2 Installing SuperDoctor5**


The Supermicro SuperDoctor® 5 is a hardware monitoring program that functions in a command-line or web-based interface in Windows and Linux operating systems. The program monitors system health information such as CPU temperature, system voltages, system power consumption, fan speed, and provides alerts via email or Simple Network Management Protocol (SNMP).

SuperDoctor 5 comes in local and remote management versions and can be used with Nagios to maximize your system monitoring needs. With SuperDoctor 5 Management Server (SSM Server), you can remotely control power on/off and reset chassis intrusion for multiple systems with SuperDoctor 5 or IPMI. SD5 Management Server monitors HTTP, FTP, and SMTP services to optimize the efficiency of your operation.



**Note:** The default User Name and Password for SuperDoctor 5 is admin /admin.

# Appendix C

# **UEFI BIOS Recovery Instructions**

**Warning:** Do not upgrade the BIOS unless your system has a BIOS-related issue. Flashing the wrong BIOS can cause irreparable damage to the system. In no event shall Supermicro be liable for direct, indirect, special, incidental, or consequential damages arising from a BIOS update. If you need to update the BIOS, do not shut down or reset the system while the BIOS is updating to avoid possible boot failure.

# C-1 An Overview to the UEFI BIOS

The Unified Extensible Firmware Interface (UEFI) specification provides a software-based interface between the operating system and the platform firmware in the pre-boot environment. The UEFI specification supports an architecture-independent mechanism for add-on card initialization to allow the UEFI OS loader, which is stored in the add-on card, to boot up the system. UEFI offers a clean, hands-off control to a computer system at bootup.

# C-2 How to Recover the UEFI BIOS Image (-the Main BIOS Block)

A UEF BIOS flash chip consists of a recovery BIOS block, comprised of a main BIOS block (a main BIOS image). The boot block contains critical BIOS codes, including memory detection and recovery codes for the user to flash a new BIOS image if the original main BIOS image is corrupted. When the system power is on, the boot block codes execute first. Once that is completed, the main BIOS code will continue with system initialization and bootup.

Note: Follow the BIOS Recovery instructions below for BIOS recovery when the main BIOS boot crashes. However, when the BIOS boot block crashes, you will need to follow the procedures in Appendix D.

# C-3 To Recover the Main BIOS Block Using a USB-Attached Device

This feature allows the user to recover a BIOS image using a USB-attached device without additional utilities used. A USB flash device such as a USB Flash Drive, or a USB CD/DVD ROM/RW device can be used for this purpose. However, a USB Hard Disk drive cannot be used for BIOS recovery at this time.

To perform UEFI BIOS recovery using a USB-attached device, follow the instructions below.

 Using a different machine, copy the "Super.ROM" binary image file into the disc Root "\" Directory of a USB device or a writeable CD/DVD.



**Note:** If you cannot locate the "Super.ROM" file in your driver disk, visit our website at www.supermicro.com to download the BIOS image into a USB flash device and rename it "Super ROM" for BIOS recovery use.

- Insert the USB device that contains the new BIOS image ("Super.ROM") into your USB drive and power on the system
- While powering on the system, keep pressing <Ctrl> and <Home> simultaneously on your keyboard until your hear two short beeps. This may take from a few seconds to one minute.
- After locating the new BIOS binary image, the system will enter the BIOS Recovery menu as shown below.




**Note**: At this point, you may decide if you want to start with BIOS Recovery. If you decide to proceed with BIOS Recovery, follow the procedures below.




When the screen as shown above displays, using the arrow key, select the item- "Proceed with flash update" and press the <Enter> key. You will see the progress of BIOS Recovery as shown in the screen below.



Note: <u>Do not interrupt</u> the process of BIOS flashing until it is completed.



After the process of BIOS Recovery is complete, press any key to reboot the system.



- Using a different system, extract the BIOS package into a bootable USB flash drive.
- 8. When a DOS prompt appears, enter AMI.BAT BIOSname.### at the prompt.

Note: Do not interrupt this process until BIOS flashing is completed.

- After seeing the message that BIOS update is completed, unplug the AC power er cable from the power supply to clear CMOS, and then plug the AC power cable in the power supply again to power on the system.
- 10. Press <Del> continuously to enter the BIOS Setup utility.
- 11. Press <F3> to load default settings.
- 12. After loading default settings, press <F4> to save the settings and exit the BIOS Setup utility.
